


WHAT SHOULD YOU DO FIRST?


- Search the specific installation's information on how they operate.
- Look for what items you will need to gain a base pass. (Passport, I.D. etc.)
- Call the Visitors Center. You will visit them first. They can answer any questions you may have on access.
- It is a good idea to either print off a base map or see if they have one at the visitor's center.

CAN ANYONE GET ON BASE?

• NO

- If you, or a sponsor applies for a base pass on your behalf, and you are denied, this is called "barment".
- Any of the following reasons can cause you to be denied access to a base.
 - If you have been forcibly removed from a military base in the past and asked not to return.
 - If you are a convicted felon currently on parole.
 - If you attempt to enter a base without proper authorization.
 - If you have a history of gang affiliation.
 - If you are a registered sex offender.
 - If you have been barred from another U.S. Military base.





WHAT DO I NEED TO GAIN ACCESS.

A real I.D.

Vehicle Registration (to be presented to Visitor's Center) Proof of Insurance (to be presented to Visitor's Center) You may have to do a background check before gaining a base pass. So, plan ahead.

WHAT IS A REAL I.D.

A real I.D. must comply with the following rules to grant you access to a military base after October 2021.

- ID must have your full legal name.
- ID must have your date of birth.
- ID must have your gender.
- ID must have an identifiable number (i.e. driver's license number).
- ID must include a photo of you.
- ID must include your primary residence.
- ID must include your signature.
- ID must have "physical security features designed to prevent tampering, counterfeiting, or duplication of the document for fraudulent purposes."
- ID must be machine-readable.



ANSWER THE "WHY"

- Now you know "what" you need to get on base...but "why" do you need it?
- To get a base pass, you must have a reason to enter the installation...
- We like to refer to this as "getting your foot in the door."

GETTING YOUR FOOT IN THE DOOR.

- Find your Trixie!
- Many bases have programs for Transitioning Servicemembers to gain employment upon leaving the military.
- These programs allow employers and organizations to meet with Transitioning Servicemembers to offer them employment opportunities.
- Every base wants their Servicemembers to make a smooth transition into civilian life. This is your primary "in."

PLACES TRANSITION PROGRAMS EXIST ON INSTALLATIONS

- Army Community services
- Marine and family programs
- Fleet and family support program
- Military and family readiness center
- National Guard family program
- Army Reserve family programs
- Marine Corps reserve family resources
- Air Force reserve family program

PUTTING IT ALL TOGETHER

- Bases love Skillbridge and CSP programs. Today we have covered 2: VEEP and VIPER Transitions.
- These programs are a great way to lead into any conversation with a Transitions Officer.
- If your Local doesn't have one of these programs, there are other options. Maybe you have an apprenticeship program, or employers who are looking to hire people?
- The IBEW's structure is very similar to what soldiers are used to. (chain of command, advancement based on time and experience, employer paid benefits, legal protections, conditions of work)
- Servicemembers are able to use there G.I. Bill benefits in a number of positions in our Union. Just be careful not to say "all" as there are requirements on what qualifies.
- We are an International Union, so anyone you talk to has an opportunity in the IBEW. We just have to help them find it!
