Outgoing president Rusty Roten led the proceedings as the new leadership recited the oath in front of friends, family and their union brothers and sisters.

Business Manager Robert Corona was elected to his first full term after being appointed to the position following the departure of Joel Barton.

New president Alton Wilkerson spoke to the diversity of IBEW 11 leadership. The Business Manager and President are both people of color, a first for the local, as well as for many others in leadership. "It's an honor to be in this

Electrical Certification Delays Causing Issues

Plan ahead when dealing with DIR

ue to a high volume of applications and limited staffing with the California Department of Industrial Relations (DIR), it is taking approximately nine to 12 weeks to review and process all applications and certifications renewals (including newly turned-out apprentices). If your certification expires, you are not certified until the DIR completely processes your application and formally posts your certification.

It is recommended that you submit your application at least six months prior to your expiration date to allow for processing time and your ability to respond should the DIR request additional information or you receive a defect letter. This may require that you take continued education courses earlier than

anticipated, so plan accordingly.

We also recommend that you send a personal check as its cashing provides you with proof that your application is in process and in the queue. Only provide a money order if you can track when it was cashed. Note that your check cashing date will not determine where you are in the queue and you should anticipate that the processing will take nine to 12 weeks from the submission of your *(Continued on page 7)*

A Few Minutes With Executive Board Chairman Big John

ohn Harriel – Big John to friends and colleagues – is superintendent and diversity manager for electrical contractor Morrow Meadows, a facilitator at South Los Angeles post-prison reentry program 2nd Call and heavily involved in IBEW Local 11.

John recently was elected to a full-term on the Executive Board - of which he's Chairman - after previously being appointed.

He took a few minutes out of his day to share what it is the Executive Board does and to talk a little about integrity.

What does the Executive Board do for Local 11?

We maintain checks and balances. We check all the bills, all the checks going out, coming in, the Business Manager expenses. Anything that's related to money coming in. Changes to the classifications, all kinds of stuff. Political funds, donations, charities, everything.

What makes your job important? Checks and balances. Without it you have anarchy. This keeps everything balanced. We are the gatekeepers. You have to have individuals who sit on the Executive Board with integrity and dignity and understand that we work in concert with the Business Manager. But we don't just rubber stamp for the Business Managers. Nobody comes in telling us what to do.

There's some independence there.

Oh, absolutely, but it's independence with integrity. If we think something's wrong, we're going to say something.

Why is it important to have that integrity?

It's important because we deal with members and their families, and the integrity part is just a no-brainer as far as doing what's right by the membership and their families. You don't want someone getting this type of position who could abuse their authority, mismanage funds or something else, and then everyone gets handcuffs put on them. We don't want any of that.

hortly after District 4 Business Agent Marc Greenfield announced that he would retire on August 1, District 5 Business Agent Mitch Klein decided he too would "pull the pin" and leave Local 11 one month later on September 1.

While the timing of the two retirement announcements had nothing to do with numbers, the decisions by Greenfield and Klein made a certain sense. The two Local 11 members and business agents - each with more than 45 years of membership and 25 plus years working for their union - are also longtime friends.

"I'd been thinking about it for a while, and as soon as my wife found out Marc was going to pull the pin, she said, 'That's it. You're done,'" Klein said. "Marc and I have been talking about it for some time and we've always had it in the back of our minds that we don't want to stay in this trade until we drop dead or something bad happens. It just came time."

"I enjoyed the work being

a business agent for over 25 years, but it's just time," echoed Greenfield. "I had picked a day – August 1 – and said I was done. Then Mitch was hemming and hawing and finally a couple weeks ago, he said, 'September 1, I'm gone.' I said, 'very good.' We can't get away from each other."

Klein and Greenfields' fathers – both named Arnold – were friends as well as electricians, and the families socialized before their sons were born. Mitch Klein worked in the trade a year before he "came off the street" and entered the apprenticeship program. He has been a business rep since 1993. Klein has been a member of the Local 11 Examining Board and Greenfield has served three terms for the Local 11 Executive Board.

Working together for many years on behalf of the local, the two friends resolved to help Robert Corona in his bid to be elected Local 11's business manager in June. That accomplished, and with their replacements at the ready (Brett Moss will succeed Greenfield in District 4; Beto Gonzales will take over District 5); Greenfield and Klein say they are

fter 25 years as a union electrician and the last 17 working for IBEW Local 11, District 1 Business Agent Shomari Davis has retired.

Davis spoke with *News at 11* before the July General Membership meeting, which he was attending for an opportunity to see some familiar faces before riding off into the sunset.

Davis said the time was right with talented, young members taking leadership roles throughout the union. "We have some really, really strong, young folks coming in," Davis said. "I know we're in good hands, and the timing worked out."

Davis worked in the film industry but wanted a career that would help him provide for his family and give him the time to raise his two sons. He cited the consistency and reliability of union work, in addition to its pay and benefits.

"It really allowed me to rear my sons," Davis said. "The union allowed me to be able to be there to raise my sons, and that was really important." During the interview at the July General Membership meeting, IBEW Local 11 Political Director Antonio Sanchez laid out Davis's legacy at the union.

"Shomari's organizing is one of the reasons the local is as diverse as it is now," Sanchez said.

Davis is not planning to spend retirement golfing, fishing, or just taking it easy. He's joining the Build Decarbonization Coalition, which works to transform buildings through clean energy. Davis will serve as a liaison between the BDC and Labor.

His new role is fitting. "It's about relationships," Davis



said of his time at Local 11. "The relationships that you make with staff and with members, with all of the people that are involved with this, is where all the gold is."

Secretary Buttigieg, Mayor Bass Announce New **Funding to Electrify L.A. Buses**

he office of Los Angeles Mayor Karen Bass recently announced new federal funding of nearly \$80 million to electrify Metro buses to reduce air pollution. This follows nearly \$900 million in federal funding announced earlier this year.

"We are preparing to be on the world stage in a way that will benefit every corner of Los Angeles by expanding and improving the transportation system in a sustainable way that creates good paying union jobs," said Mayor Bass.

Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg joined Bass in making the funding announcement.

"With funding made possible by President Biden's Bipartisan Infrastructure Law, we're helping connect even more people across LA County with affordable, reliable public transportation," said U.S. Transportation Secretary Pete Buttigieg. "These investments will help increase Metro ridership, get more cars off the road, make the air in LA cleaner for every single adult, and child, who breathes it in each day."

According to the release from the Mayor's office, the Low or No Emission Grant funding will go toward zero-emission buses and charging infrastructure. It is the second largest funding award out of more than 100 projects funded

by the federal government. The grant funding provided by the Federal Transit Administration will allow Metro to procure batteryelectric buses, charging equipment, and supporting infrastructure to provide reliable zero-emission service along bus routes that operate from Metro's Bus Division 7 in West Hollywood. These zero-emission buses will replace compressed natural gas buses that

have exceeded their useful service life, creating more sustainable transportation options ahead of upcoming international sporting events hosted in Los Angeles.

In March, the Los Angeles region secured nearly \$900 million in funding to strengthen critical infrastructure, expand the Metro Rail system and reconnect communities ahead of the 2028 Olympic and Paralympic Games.

application date, if submitted correctly.

The DIR has also published the following guidance on their website:

If you have received a defect letter requesting additional information, please provide a copy of that letter, driver's license or identification card number, and a brief description of your situation. If your submission doesn't require payment and you've reached the 12-week review time without a response, please reply with your detailed inquiry and driver's license or identification card number. Your inquiry will be reviewed in the order it's received. Please do not send multiple emails

as it delays our ability to process applications.

As a recap:

- 1) send your application at least six months in advance
- 2) pay with a check (if applicable) 3) monitor your email/mail for updates

4) anticipate that it is a 12-week process


5) continue to check your certification status at dir.ca.gov/DLSE/ ECU/ElectCert/ElectCertSearch.asp

Finally, if you have not received a response from the DIR 12 weeks after your submission date, please notify Veronica Martinez at martinez@ibew11. org and provide your full name, application submission date, proof of payment, certification number (if applicable) and driver's license number.
