he upcoming presidential election will have big consequences for our country and the world. With that said, I'm not going to focus this month's column on that. Vice President Kamala Harris will carry California, that's a fact.

Instead, I want to focus on a Congressional race in the Antelope Valley, where we can make a real difference. A few hours ago, I learned that the contest between Mike Garcia and George Whitesides is a total toss-up. Recent polling has them dead even, 50/50.

That is why we're asking members to volunteer with us and help elected George Whitesides in CA 27. George has been a friend to the IBEW, has toured the ETI and pledged to support IBEW's priorities in Congress when he gets to Washington, D.C.

LA County Measure A - YES

Also called the "Affordable Housing, Homelessness Solutions and Prevention Now" measure, Measure A will replace a quarter-cent sales tax with a half-cent sales tax to help fund housing and homeless services. Money from the tax, forecast to generate about \$1.2 billion annually, would go toward affordable housing, mental health care and substance abuse treatment, among other homeless services.

LAUSD Facilities Bond Measure US - YES

Los Angeles Unified School District's Measure US, also called the "Local Public Schools Safety and Upgrades Measure," is a \$9 billion bond to upgrade and improve school facilities. The bond would be paid for through property taxes, 2.5 cents per \$100 assessed value annually. Widespread campus modernization will lead to construction jobs. More than 60 percent of school buildings are more than 50 years old and in need of improvements.

Long Beach City College Bond Measure AC - YES

Measure AC in Long Beach is a college facilities bond measure to complete repairs and upgrades to Long Beach City College facilities. Also called the "Long Beach Community College District affordable education, classroom repair, career and first responder training improvement measure," AC will authorize \$990,000,000 in bonds funded by \$25 per year for every \$100,000 of assessed property value. The measure will create numerous job opportunities.

courts on the main floor, retractable bleacher seating, a practice court, locker rooms, an aerobics room and more. A small theater for screenings or live performances will be on the second floor.

Once the new gym is up and running, what was once called the boys gym will also be torn down and replaced with a new building featuring 46 new classrooms.

Work will run into 2028.

The new gym's design reflects the older aesthetic of the remaining classroom building.

Spencer Mixon has been on the job site for a few weeks.

"We have a lot of work here," Mixon said. "It's really cool to see the old historic side of the building and then us bringing in the new side, kind of matching the design. We're trying to keep the old look to it. It's pretty cool work to do."

Dion Mitchell has worked at the site for more than two years. He's seen the new gym rise from just dirt to the impressive structure it is today.

"I feel proud," Mitchell said. "When I come in and see something that we've done, I did that. To know this is something that's going to be here for years after I'm gone, it's nice to know I had a part in that."

Concurrently, the school's old classroom building from the 1930s is undergoing an extensive remodel. Students are temporarily learning in bungalows.

The renovation of Jefferon's old school building is a juxtaposition to the new construction of the gym. Jose Carrillo explained that navigating an older building poses challenges.

"There's some design issues," Carrillo said. "We have to become the engineer at times and give options to getting the work actually done, not just on paper but physically."

"Being highly trained and highly skilled, we see that everything that we did in our apprenticeship actually comes to fruition when we're out in the field solving problems," Carrillo added.

Construction at an active high school is challenging. The work is being done on a small footprint, and classes are in session. Noise and logistics are two topics discussed at the morning huddle.

"Just got to be mindful," said foreman Chris Bonilla. "Safety is number one, especially when it comes to the kids."

Bonilla explained that the Los Angeles Unified School District presents another level of code on top of the usual requirements.

"LAUSD has their own way of doing things, way of seeing things," Bonilla said. "At the end of the day, it's a building. Electrical is electrical."

Iosif Oncu has been at the job site since March and has good things to say about the process.

"It's very organized," Oncu said. "We have a strong support from our Superintendent."

For Michael Espinoza, who is in his first year of apprenticeship, it's been a learning experience.

"I've learned a lot," Espinoza said. "Pulling while seeing a little bit of single-line material. Learning how to handle material. Working side by side with the journeymen."











































Members Speak Out

COMPLIANCE REPORT

s someone who sits at the compliance seat in our industry, I've witnessed firsthand how federal laws shape our landscape, particularly regarding job opportunities for our members. One significant area of focus is Project Labor Agreements (PLAs). Understanding their evolution can shed light on how presidential policies directly affect our work and the economy.

The Historical Context of PLAs

The journey of PLAs in federal projects dates back to the Clinton administration, when they were mandated on several significant construction projects. However, in 2001, President George W. Bush signed an Executive Order prohibiting PLAs on federally funded projects. While he did provide a mechanism for project-specific exemptions, it's telling that only one request was made during his tenure.

Fast forward to the Obama administration,

which recognized the value of PLAs, especially for large-scale projects. An Executive Order encouraging their use reinstated the focus on fairness and local investment, countering the previous administration's stance. This period marked a resurgence in the understanding of PLAs as not just a labor agreement but a catalyst for job creation.

Trump, Biden, and the Future of PLAs

The Trump administration saw a concerted effort by organizations like the AGC and ABC to dismantle the pro-PLA stance established by Obama. However, President Biden has taken this further than any of his predecessors, mandating PLAs for most large-scale federal construction projects. This policy shift aims not only to create jobs but also to ensure that local economies benefit from federal investments.

The Stakes of Project 2025

As we approach the upcoming elections, it's crucial to consider the implications of Project 2025, which threatens to undermine labor unions and abolish PLAs. The potential changes



could directly affect job security, overtime requirements, and the rights of workers.

With twenty years of data supporting the notion that PLAs create jobs and invest in local economies, the upcoming election is more than just a civic duty; it's an opportunity to shape the future of our industry. When you step into the voting booth this November, remember the significance of your choice—not just for today, but for the future of construction jobs and the prosperity of our communities.

Rosemond's parents immigrated to the United States nearly 50 years ago. Her dad is from St. Lucia and her mom is from Belize. They met when they got to Los Angeles and eventually got married and started a family. Rosemond was born and raised in South LA as the youngest of seven children.

After attending college for a semester Rosemond began her posthigh school journey by joining the Navy in 2008.

There were multiple reasons for that decision.

"I wanted to leave LA and travel and get free education," she said.

Rosemond's service in the Navy began with weeks of classroom work, where she gained a lot of technical knowledge that has been the foundation for her career.

Working as an electrician's mate, Rosemond spent four years in the Navy, doing mainly a lot of maintenance and repairs on a ship.

Despite gaining a lot of valuable experience, she decided to leave the military.

"I wanted to do something different," Rosemond said. "I think four years was enough."

Following her military service Rosemond lived for two years in Virginia, where she attended school at ITT Tech and worked at a shipyard as a deck electrician doing new construction on the U.S. Gerald Ford, the last Navy carrier to be commissioned.

Rosemond's next move was to come back to LA and spend the next three years at jobs unrelated to

electrical work.

But that lasted only so long before she decided to get back into the trade.

Rosemond joined IBEW Local Union 11 in 2018.

It's a decision that she believes has been greatly beneficial for her.

"It gave me the opportunity to build on my skills that I already had from the military and the shipyard," Rosemond said. "I learned a whole new set of electrical skills like working on a refinery, a water treatment plant and residential. I didn't know how to do residential before."

Rosemond, who is currently employed by SVE, credits working as a union electrician for allowing her to buy her first house and live a comfortable life.

Her current job entails both residential and commercial work.

Part of the time she works on low-income housing running MC wires and putting in boxes. On the commercial side she works on large boxes, EMT Pipe ending, and installing supports.

Much of her work has her following drawings.

"I enjoy my job," Rosemond said.
"It allows me to have a blank space and then I use my skills to create the drawing on my own. I like doing that. It's pretty cool."

Rosemond is also happy and proud of what she has been able to do with her life.

"I think that it is a big accomplishment for me and my family," Rosemond said. "It's pretty fulfilling that they were able to come here and raise someone who can be a part of something so great."
