Women's Luncheon Builds Momentum, Mentorship for Women in Trades

2nd Annual Luncheon Celebrates Progress, Expands Opportunities for Women

IBEW Local 11's Women's Luncheon returned for its second year earlier this month,

serving as a catalyst for the Local's push to empower women in the trades. This year's event centered on women's experiences in the construction industry, and highlighted the importance

of mentorship and leadership in allowing women to thrive in their jobs.

Attendance at the luncheon nearly doubled from last year, as more than 120 women from Local 11 showed up to break

bread and network along with invited guests and supporters. The gathering's purpose was clear: to celebrate progress, expand opportunity, and build durable networks that will carry women forward in union careers that are changing lives and shaping Los Angeles' future.

"We want to make sure that our women have opportunities to be involved, be a part of this local union, and continue to be successful and have the support that they need to thrive in our industry," said Diana Limon, Local 11's director of Women Recruitment and Support. "These events are important because women often don't see other women on jobsites. So, bringing these women together allows them to engage with others so they have a really strong network and support system."

This year's event featured a deliberate strategy to create connections across jobsites, specialties, and experience levels. Organizers used an intentional seating chart to maximize new relationships by matching attendees by classification and years on the job so that Local 11 workers and prospective members could exchange insight and

Powering the Entertainment Industry's Next Era


Creative Arts Alliance's (CAA) new state-of-the-art, 400,000-square-foot space in the 37-story Century City Center to host its clients from across the sports and entertainment industries is swiftly taking shape thanks to the dozens of IBEW Local 11 members powering the project.

The 569-foot-tall tower at 1950 S. Avenue of the Stars in Los

Angeles features more than 730,000 square feet of office, retail, restaurant, and fitness space and is slated to open next year as the new home of CAA.


The new building boasts cutting-edge lighting systems, which will be seamlessly integrated with advanced audiovisual technology in its conference rooms. IBEW Local 11, which at one point had nearly 100 workers on the project, is spearheading the electrical work through CSI Electric as members install lighting, power fire alarm systems, and finalize HVAC

BUSINESS MANAGER'S MESSAGE



Reflecting on 2025 and Charging Up for the New Year

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Take a breath – 2025 has been quite a ride.

IBEW 11 has endured a whirlwind of a year that tested our resolve. Our members faced disaster as wildfires ripped through Altadena, an uncertain work outlook due to city budget cuts, and jobsite disruptions due to ICE raids and a National Guard deployment.

But we pushed through and are ending 2025 in a much better place than we started. Let's take a look back at the challenges our members faced this year, and more importantly, the achievements and triumphs of our local that showcased the very best of who we are at IBEW 11.

Securing Jobs and Powering the Olympics

It's no secret that the Los Angeles Convention Center was in need of a makeover ahead of the 2028 Summer Olympics. The last time the convention center was renovated was my first job as an apprentice in 1991. This looked like a done deal earlier this year, but budget cuts threatened this project.

What followed was an impressive display of solidarity and collective power showcased by IBEW 11 and its partners in the building trades across the city. We leveraged City Hall to ensure that this \$2.6 billion remodel passed City Council, putting our members to work as we prepare to showcase our city during the 2028 Summer Olympics.

Our work didn't stop at securing big jobs for our members. This year, we

continued to add new members and were recognized for our efforts to organize contractors.

I'm proud to report that we've increased our membership across the board by 3 percent, which puts us at about 11,700 members. And those weren't in one area. We've doubled our residential apprentice intake, brought in more ITS electricians, added more sound and communication electricians, and continued to grow our number of inside wireman.

We were also recognized at this year's IBEW Membership Development Conference and won the award for most contractors organized for all IBEW locals in the U.S. and Canada from August 2024 to July 2025. We're immensely proud of this accomplishment and are continuing to organize contractors.

Disasters and Disruptions

None of us could have predicted the devastation of the wildfires that hit us all in the beginning of 2025, particularly in Altadena where so many of us live. The winds were fierce and fueled fires that caused eight IBEW 11 members to lose their homes and another 11 members to be displaced for a time.

Seeing the devastation firsthand is a sight that is forever seared in my mind.

But through this tragedy, we saw IBEW 11 and locals throughout the area come together to help our Brothers and Sisters rebuild. The Executive Board approved

much-needed donations for affected members, and the support also poured in from other locals and organizations.

The sense of brotherhood, sisterhood, and community our local showed following the fires exemplifies the true spirit of IBEW 11 and what we're all about.

That wasn't the only obstacle outside of our control that we faced this year.

Jobsites around our area faced disruptions and in some cases had to be shut down as ICE raids became more and more prevalent. The National Guard deployment and the ensuing protests caused our members and workers from other locals to lose work.

We've thankfully come out well on the other side of these work disruptions and we're looking forward to entering the new year without these unpredictable losses of work.

Out of these tragedies and work disruptions, we've continued to work diligently to secure work for our contractors and members. A silver lining that emerged from a fire in a

processing unit at Chevron's El Segundo Refinery has given our members the opportunity to get to work rebuilding it.

form bonds. The goal of this strategy, organizers said, was to ensure that no woman left without a new contact to call for advice or support on the job.

That approach reflects Local 11's larger mission – empowering and equipping new female apprentices and journey-level workers, educating women about the opportunities union membership offers, combatting and overcoming stereotypes women still face, and securing more representation at the executive level. This year's program extended an invitation to prospective members, giving them a look at union life, the work itself, and the long-term economic benefits of union membership.

"It's extremely important to have women be exposed to opportunities," Limon said. "We strive greatly here in this local union to make sure that our women feel supported and that they have access to all the opportunities that many of us have had coming through this trade."

For many, the event's impact resonated at home as much as at work. Myra Hildreth, an inside wireman journeyman and an organizer for Districts 2 and

3, said the luncheon shines a light on the opportunities that IBEW 11 offers its members.

"We need more women in our trades, we just need more," Hildreth said, noting that her daughter is a high school senior and is exploring a career in the trades. "The benefits of joining the union are in the long-term. If you're interested in IBEW, we encourage you to join."

Others spoke of the opportunities IBEW 11 has provided them. Perla Munoz, a mother and U.S. Navy veteran, said she moved into the area from Bakersfield recently and "stumbled" into the Veteran's Electrical Entry Program (VEEP). The program, which included all women, gave her the opportunity to enter the inside wireman five-year apprenticeship program through IBEW 11.

Guests of IBEW 11 praised the women in attendance for not just their acumen on the jobsite, but for "kicking the door open" to allow the younger generations of women to succeed in the construction trades.

"You are proof not to the world, but to all the young girls watching, that talent is no longer about gender, skill has no gender, leadership has

no gender, and excellence certainly does not have gender," said Yvonne Wheeler, president of the LA Federation of Labor. "Every time you pick up your tools, every time you walk on a jobsite, mentor an apprentice, or speak up in a meeting, you're not only doing the work, you're changing the culture."

The event carried a celebratory tone, but speakers repeatedly acknowledged the persistence required to achieve lasting change. Jennifer Murphy, an electrician supervisor for the city of Los Angeles and a solar crew supervisor, reflected on decades of efforts to increase women's participation in the trades. While the number of women in the trades hasn't grown as fast as advocates once hoped, the trades remain a powerful engine for good wages, substantial benefits, and a supportive community, Murphy said.

"When it comes to the women in the trades, every single one of us has made a positive life choice, an affirmative commitment to this entire life, which did not come easy," Murphy said, noting how grateful and proud she is of her 21 years with IBEW 11. "I think that that's one of the reasons that the women, I think, are very successful in

the apprenticeships. I think it's one of the reasons we're very successful and committed to the jobs, is that it didn't just fall in our laps. We're here because we want to be here. We're here

because we fought to be here, and I couldn't be more proud."

Building on the success of these two luncheons, organizers said they're already looking forward to what next year's event could bring.

"It's important that we continue to provide opportunities especially for women that are underrepresented, and this is one way of getting that exposure," Limon said. "And so we very much look forward to doing this every year and getting bigger and better every year."



connections, among other jobs.

"It's definitely state-of-the-art. A lot of lighting is on a whole other level of complexity," said Bryan Newcomb, a site superintendent. "From room to room, they'll have different lighting systems in their conference rooms that will integrate with the AV system. They'll be able to do big conference calls from anywhere around the world in these rooms."

Local 11 members have been working at the site since March and were working six days a week of 10-hour shifts to keep up with the strict deadline of June 2026. Overtime has scaled down as members caught up to the timeline, but about 70 Local 11 members are on sight to complete the job.

For General Foreman Jose Anguiano, each day starts with a flex and stretch session to prepare for the day, followed by a meeting with two other foremen to review the day's goals. Above all of the roles members have day in and day out on the jobsite, Anguiano said the most important one is to work safely.

"One of the things we go through is our daily job hazard analysis," Anguiano said. "We make sure that they're using ladders properly, which involves a lot of stuff that we use here. We make sure that they're wearing their gloves, all of their PPE, and that they're aware of their surroundings, especially now that finishes are being installed."

That focus on safety is one of the major differences that


fifth-year apprentice Fabian Santillan saw from nonunion jobs when he made the decision to join Local 11.

"Safety was the first difference I saw when I came over to Local 11," said Santillan, who worked nonunion for 15 years before joining the union. "The attitude there was like, 'Oh, we have to get it done.' Safety is the most important thing here."

The union's emphasis on safety is one of the keys that keeps Local 11 strong, said journeyman inside wireman Jose Perez, who has been a member of the union for 21 years. Perez pointed to the training culture in the IBEW that constantly provides members with training opportunities to do their jobs better and keep their coworkers safe.

After joining the union, Perez said the certificate-based training included everything from safe forklift practices to CPR and OSHA-related training, all of which his former nonunion employer never provided. The tradition of learning in the IBEW, Perez said, allows veteran members to pass along lessons to the next generation.

"The one thing that I love about this union is it's a brotherhood. Because I'm a journeyman, I get an apprentice, and I'm gonna teach them the right way how to do things," Perez said. "It just goes down the line. They learn the right way. Then they teach the next guy and the next guy, and that's how we are – union strong in everything we do."



IBEW Local 11 Is Stepping Up

IBEW Local 11 is partnering with Habitat for Humanity to help rebuild homes in Altadena that were destroyed in the catastrophic wildfires earlier this year.
